APIASF & CARE's PEER Project Receives New Grant from Kresge to support students

In the second year of a three-year initiative to bring national attention to and improve educational outcomes for Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) college students, APIASF and the National Commission on Asian American and Pacific Islander Research in Education (CARE) continue to work together through the Partnership for Equity in Education through Research (PEER) project. Through an ongoing partnership with the Kresge Foundation, APIASF and CARE recently received a grant to expand the PEER project's efforts, broadening the foundation's support of innovation in higher education.

The Kresge Foundation grant further advances the PEER project's activities of providing scholarships, institutional capacity-building, and institutional collaboration based on research--all designed to help AAPI students realize their full degree-earning potential. In addition, the grant supports the PEER project's collaborative work via select Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institutions (AANAPISIs), allowing for more robust dissemination of research about the significance of AANAPISIs and their role of improving outcomes for low-income AAPI students.

The second research report to be published through the PEER project, titled *Measuring the Impact of Student Success*, will be released April 10 and will report on findings from evaluations of federally funded AANAPISI programs at City College of San Francisco, De Anza College and South Seattle Community College.

AANAPISI Profile: University of Illinois at Chicago

The Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institution (AANAPISI) program was created by the U.S. Department of Education and was designed to improve retention, transfer and graduation rates of underserved Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) students.



The University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC) is using their grant funds in part to support their UIC AANAPISI Initiative, a demographic research project coordinated through their Asian American Resource and Cultural Center (AARCC).

With an aim to serve the UIC student body, twenty percent of whom identify as Asian

American, AARCC's goals are to:

- Provide education and resources for and about Asian Americans
- Increase awareness of diverse Asian American issues, cultures and communities
- Strengthen the Asian American campus community
- Promote the growth of Asian American Studies through curricular and co-curricular partnerships
- Guide Asian American students in reaching their academic, personal and professional potential

The Center offers social, cultural and educational programs that promote knowledge of and foster engagement with issues relating to Asian Americans and Asian American studies. The co-curricular programs enhance the UIC experience and provide opportunities for integrated learning and development.

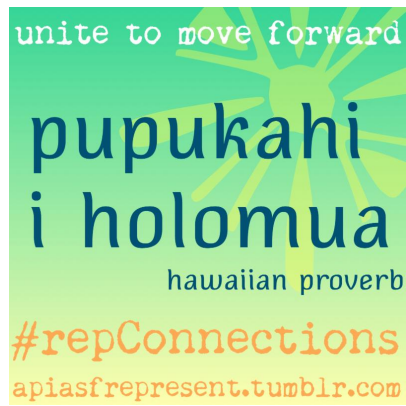
